

Updating Nature Without Borders

We are grateful to have the opportunity to work with five UBC graduate students this summer to review and revise Nature Without Borders and to assess its implementation success since it was endorsed in 2013 by all four local Comox Valley governments.

"We were very fortunate to be selected by UBC's Sustainability Scholars program for this opportunity," said CVLT Executive Director Tim Ennis. "The students will be from different academic disciplines. They will revisit the Nature Without Borders report and work to update and improve it."

Nature Without Borders was originally produced in 2008 and updated in 2013. It quickly became an important resource for local government policy development such as the regional growth strategy, official community plans, and parks and trails planning. The updated report is expected to be similarly influential.

Welcome Françoise Gervais



We are pleased to welcome Françoise Gervais as the new Comox Valley Conservation Partnership program coordinator.

Originally from Quebec, Françoise made the move to Cumberland in 2011 and fell in love with the valley. She is a self-taught wildlife and landscape photographer with a master's degree in land use planning. She spent the first years of her career creating nature reserves. The spirit of adventure then led her to study one of the most unexplored places on Earth: the deep sea. She participated in numerous oceanographic expeditions, where she studied hydrothermal vents, submarine canyons and deep-sea species. Shortly thereafter Françoise went to the polar regions to work as an expedition guide. Since then she has dedicated her career to creating a deeper connection with nature and building a bridge between it and the people she guided.

From diving under icebergs while filming polar bears and narwhals to assisting scientists in the field, Françoise's expertise and experience is unique and we are confident that CVCP will benefit greatly from her contributions.

We are also pleased to welcome Lesley Giroday as a new director of the CVLT board.

A retired lawyer, Lesley moved to the Comox Valley in September 2020 to take advantage of the area's abundant outdoor spaces and activities. She has a strong interest in community conservation work. She started the Elk Valley Conservation Society in Fernie, worked for the East Kootenay Environmental Society, negotiated the East Kootenay CORE land use plan, sat on the board of the BC-Yukon chapter of the Canadian Parks and Wilderness Society, served on the first coordinating committee of the Yellowstone to Yukon Conservation Initiative, and is a director of the East Kootenay environmental organization Wildsight.

Lesley is a member of our Land Protection Committee, and her expertise will be applied there as well as in other areas of interest.
